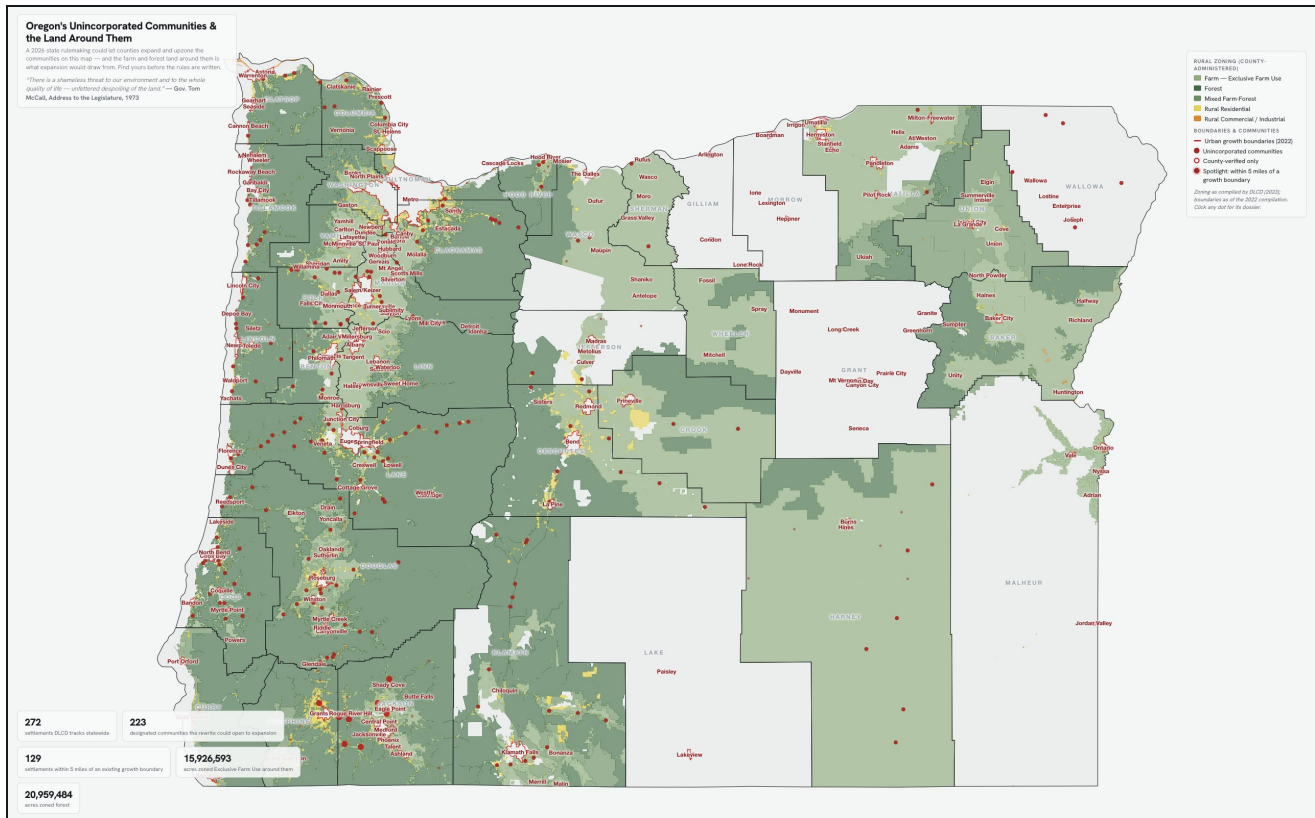


One rulemaking could redraw rural Oregon.

Oregon's Land Conservation and Development Commission is considering new rules for housing in unincorporated communities — the rural places outside every city and its urban growth boundary. The proposal could let counties expand these communities outward and rezone them for urban-scale development, on land that is farm and forest today. The need for homes is real. But where rural rezoning has been tried, the documented record shows estates — not homes people can afford.
